

Walking Together as Disciples for Life: Disciples are Alive in Christ

"I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." (Galatians 2:20, ESV)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we continue our theme together, "Walking Together as Disciples for Life," we hear the words of St. Paul to the Galatians: "I have been crucified with Christ." The call to be a disciple of Jesus is a call to die, and that call and that death have occurred for us in the same place: our baptism.

In Romans 6, Paul says, "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life."

These words that Paul says are not metaphorical. They are real. All of us who have been baptized really are alive to God in Christ! We're not wannabes; we're the real, live thing. We are real, live disciples who are alive to God in Christ.

Yet, as Pastor Jeffrey Leininger says, "To be 'alive in Christ' by implication means to be dead to something else." Being alive in Christ means we have died to sin, to this world and its evil ways, to death, and to the devil. Being alive in Christ as His disciples means that, in the words of Pastor Leininger, we have died to a way of "life curved in upon self and self-indulgence and self-seeking ways."

This death happened when were called as Jesus' disciples through Holy Baptism. There our old sinful self with all of its fallen and selfish ways died, and we arose as a new creation in Christ. But the old nature (dead though it is) hangs around. We all know that there are many times when we think, speak, and act out of our old sinful nature, against God and our neighbor. That's why, as Luther points out in his *Small Catechism*, we need to die and rise every day.

What does such baptizing with water indicate?

It indicates that the Old Adam [or Eve] in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, and that a new man [or woman] should daily emerge and arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

This doesn't mean that we need to be rebaptized over and over again. Baptism need happen only once, because Jesus died once and for all. But every day, we are called to *live in the power of our baptism*. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, through hearing God's Word, and through walking in prayer, we can live every day in the power of being disciples who are alive in Christ. We do so by remembering daily who we are in baptism: people who have died and are now alive. In so doing we die to self daily and are raised daily to live for God and for our neighbor. As disciples of Christ, we live daily by dying.

As we walk together at Jehovah Lutheran, we walk as people who have died to all selfish desires, as people who have died to living for ourselves, and we live as people who are alive in Christ. As we walk together in outreach, seeking ways to share our blessings and our faith with our neighbors, we do so as people who have been made alive and live from that empowerment every single day. You have died! You are alive! Live in Christ!

2 Peter 1:16-21

Peter testifies as an eyewitness to Jesus receiving honor and glory from God, the Father, on the mountain where God said, "This is my Son, my Beloved."

Matthew 17:1-9

Jesus takes his three disciples on the mountain where he was transfigured before them and a voice says, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!"

February 26 Genesis 3:1-21

The first humans disobeyed and so excluded themselves from community with God.

Romans 5:12-19

Through Adam's disobedience all humanity came under the dominion of sin and death. Through Christ's obedience all receive the free gift of justification and life.

Matthew 4:1-11
