

Walking Together as Disciples for Life:

The Congregation: Baptized Sinners

16 Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. ¹⁷ And when they saw him they worshiped him, but some doubted. ¹⁸ And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. ¹⁹ Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:16-20 (ESV)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We continue looking at the job description that Jesus has given to us as His disciples. Jesus has told us as His disciples that our calling is to participate in making more disciples, and He tells us how to do this:

- Baptizing
- Teaching
- Holding fast to what He has commended to us

This month, we continue to meditate on baptism, specifically on how as a congregation we are made up of people who have been baptized. As we look at last month, baptism has ongoing effects in the Christian life. As Luther explains in his *Small Catechism*, we die daily to sin and live to God. This is true for each one of us personally in our walk with the Lord, and it is true about all of us collectively as we walk together. We as Christ's Church are daily being put to death and daily raised to live a new life. We are, because we are still sinners, with thoughts, words, and deeds against God and one another.

So we should not be surprised when, in the Church, we observe and experience sinful and hurtful words and acts from our brothers and sisters who are baptized, redeemed sinners. For each one of us are sinners, even though we have been saved by God's grace in Jesus. And as sinners, we are going to sin. As sinners, our brothers and sisters in Christ are going to sin against us, even in our life together in the Church.

All of us have experienced this, and yet, too often we are surprised by this. Often, we object—sometimes loudly and publicly—that this should not happen "in the Church." Perhaps our surprise flows from an idealized picture of what we think Church life should look like. Dietrich Bonhoeffer criticizes Christians having a concept of an idealized, perfect congregation, which does not exist in this life. Holding onto such a view even when it is contradicted, says Bonhoeffer, can be disastrous for one's faith and can shatter one's relationships with others.

An idealized view of what we think a congregation should look like—particularly when it is one where we do not expect our brothers and sisters ever to sin—is not realistic. As such, an idealized view of a congregation can absorb our thoughts to such an extent that we miss God's gracious gift of Christian community right in front of us in the gathering of our brothers and sisters. When we find fault, criticize, and highlight the sins of others in our midst, we demonstrate a lack of gratitude to our Lord for those He has put in our lives to walk together with us on the way to our eternal home.

And when we point out the faults of others, we also risk serious hypocrisy. For as the old saying goes, when we point our finger at another person, we have three fingers pointing back at ourselves. As St. John reminds us in his first letter, "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us."

Rather than point out and complain about the sins of our brothers and sisters, we should recognize that we are all in the same boat. We are all sinners. This is why we come to Church in the first place! The Church is not museum full of holy people who have no sins. The Church is a hospital full of us sinners who are infected with sin and unable to cure ourselves.

We all stand before God's Law accused as sinners by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We all undergo the Law's work of putting our sins to death, so that we can be raised to life again and again by the Good News that Jesus has taken away our sins and given us His own righteousness.

We all stand equal: equally unable to save ourselves from our sinful condition and equally forgiven for the sake of Jesus Christ. As God's baptized children, we are invited to see one another in that regard, to see each other as people for whom Jesus died and who have been washed clean in Holy Baptism. We are invited to repent of our sins daily, to have our sins put to death daily—even the sin of judging our brothers and sisters. We are invited to start over again daily, forgiven of our sins and forgiving the sins of others, because the blood of Jesus covers us all.

ST. PAUL OUTREACH CENTER

The Jehovah-based St. Paul Outreach Center is unfolding! This ministry to new immigrants to the U.S. is a partnership of JELC, Mekane Yesus, our circuit LCMS Churches, and POBLO (People of the Book Lutheran Outreach), with financial support from the LCMS Minnesota South District.

The ministry will have three "prongs": small group fellowship/English conversation family pairings, after school programs for children and youth, and health resources from New Life Family Services.

We have successfully launched pilot offerings in two of these areas. In coordination with POBLO, Marc and Suzanne Hequet have shared their time and friendship with a new Afghani family this spring and summer. Starting in June, our Mekane Yesus sister church has piloted a soccer camp for youth each Friday afternoon for neighborhood children. We hope to build on these offerings in the coming months.

Two large events are planned for this fall to further develop this ministry. In partnership with Concordia University St. Paul's campus ministry, we will host an International potluck for new students and circuit church members on Friday, September 8 at 6:30 pm. Also in partnership with CSP, we will host a coat drive give-away on Saturday, October 14.

Please look for more details to come soon for how to participate in this exciting new ministry. We will for sure be seeking volunteers for the English conversation/fellowship pairings, the September 8 potluck, and the October 14 coat drive. 

"We preach Christ crucified" (1 COR. 1:23).

We chose this simple statement as the theme for our upcoming LCMS convention in Milwaukee. As I have prepared for the convention, these words have resonated in my mind. These words describe our church. We, the LCMS, preach Christ crucified along with the apostles and the whole Christian church throughout the world.

Not only do we enjoy fellowship with every Christian of every time and place, but we also seek to reach all people with the Gospel, for not all have heard. One thing that diminishes our ability to share the Good News with all people is language. Since the tower of Babel in Genesis 11, people have spoken different languages. Yet as we learned in Acts 2, the message of the Gospel unites people into the one Body of Christ.

Therefore, we have designated our 2023–2026 LCMS National Offering, "We Preach Christ Crucified for All People," for the translation of solid biblical Lutheran resources into languages that lack such materials. Whatever you generously contribute to this offering will enable this vital work. We thank God for all those who have labored to translate the Scriptures. You will help provide instructional and doctrinal resources LCMS congregations can use to reach and instruct non-English speakers in His Word.

Our 2019 convention theme verses included Paul's words, "Pray without ceasing" (1 THESS. 5:17). I have made it my habit to pray before I start my day, praying for individuals, members of my congregation, international church leaders, people I have met and, of course, the Synod at large. Many times, the Psalms of David provide the words for my prayers.

I invite you to take this insert home to assist you in your personal or family prayers. Pray for those who translate Lutheran resources, that their labor would produce faithful and beneficial materials for those who use them. Pray for those who receive their work. Pray for our international church partners. Pray for all those who do not know Jesus. Join me in daily prayers, for our Lord has graciously invited us to bring before Him all our concerns, all through Jesus Christ crucified and risen. We preach Christ crucified — for all people.

Isaiah 51:1-6

"Listen to me . . . " The Lord will make good on his promise to Abraham and Sarah. His salvation will come soon and will never end.

Romans 11:33-12:8

God has shown his mercy to all. <u>Therefore</u> (v.12) those in Christ are to offer themselves in an unselfish use of spiritual gifts for upbuilding the body of Christ.

Matthew 16:13-20

Peter's confession that Jesus is the Christ leads Jesus to commission him (later all the disciples, 18:18) to proclaim the forgiveness of sins.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, also known as Lutheran Women in Mission, welcomed over 3,500 people to their 40th biennial convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, June 22–25, 2023, under the theme "Celebrate the Lord of the Nations." The convention theme was based on Psalm 33:12–13.

The Lutheran Women in Mission voting body adopted a \$2,350,000 mission goal for the 2023–2025 biennium.
